About

The National Capital Area Council, BSA Adopta-School program is an exciting and comprehensive undertaking that will connect our Scouting programs located across the DMV with schools in their communities. Participating Scouting units partner with school administrations and offer the volunteer services that will most effectively meet their school's needs with clearly-defined guidelines. Each unit will offer a minimum one-year commitment to the school. Our intent is to create a mutual and meaningful community relationship that will bring significant positive changes within the schools.



Project Scope

The Adopt-a-School program of National Capital Area Council, BSA (NCAC) was established to build strong, sustaining relationships with our local schools, creating thousands of lasting community partnerships across the DMV. Through committed volunteer efforts — from school cleanup and landscaping to Scouts' active participation in school events throughout the year — the NCAC intends to provide a defined, helpful presence in our schools.



These cooperative efforts are aimed at helping schools meet their goals for student achievement and success while proactively addressing the local community's/school's need for volunteer service and community outreach.

Scouts BSA Grades 6-12

In Scouting, leadership is learned through adventure, both in the great outdoors and in our communities. Scouts BSA learn leadership by putting the principles of Scouting into practice every day. In this timetested program, youth lead their own activities and work their way toward earning Scouting's highest rank, Eagle Scout.



Venturing is a coed program that focuses on adventure, leadership, personal growth, and service. Venturing crews are youth-led and adult-advised. Crews can have specialty interests, and youth can work on Venturing awards while also continuing to work toward Scouting's highest rank, Eagle Scout.



Sea Scouting is adventure in, on, around, and under water. Sea Scout ships are high adventure on oceans, rivers, and lakes. They provide limitless opportunities and exciting challenges while providing a place to grow and learn, find adventure, and build long-lasting friendships.

SCOUTING FOR FOOD



Scouting for Food is the National Capital Area Council, BSA's largest annual community service project to help feed families in need by collecting non-perishable food and distributing it to local food pantries and food banks. In 2023, 537,225 pounds of food were collected in support of our local communities.

DOES SCOUTING WORK?

We all know Scouting's goal is to prepare young people for life, but does it work?

Scouting was put to the test over the course of three years, when a research team from Tufts University worked with the Boy Scouts of America's Cradle of Liberty Council to measure the character attributes of both Scouts and non-Scouts — all with a goal of better understanding the character development of youth as it was happening. The project, which was funded by the John Templeton Foundation and led by Dr. Richard M. Lerner, surveyed nearly 1,800 Cub Scouts and nearly 400 non-Scouts under age 12 using both interviews and survey data. In the beginning, there were no signi cant di erences in character attributes between the two groups. By the end, however, the di erences were striking in several areas:



2,000+ Scouts and non-Scouts aged 6-12 from across the Philadelphia area were measured in 6 key areas:







The more time kids spend in Scouting, the be er the outcomes in character development




Those who a end meetings regularly report higher outcomes virtually across the board when compared to Scouts with lower a endance
